President's report for meeting 05 September 2022

We welcomed 19 people at our fun filled meeting on 5 th September, including guests Helen Carwardine (who has applied for membership), Phil Cordery visiting from Southern Districts Rotary, and AG Kenn Williams.Phil gave us a brief introduction and pointed out that there were several Raffle books with tickets for sale around the tables, funds raised are to support ROMAC initiatives. AG Kenn Williams gave an insightful talk on the Jennifer Jones Challenge, which is a District 9455 initiative, and continued on to discuss some of the changes taking place within our District and Zone.

The first was to explain that the major cause of the Redistricting in WA is based on maintaining a cost-effective organisation, and as of 01 July 2023 all of WA will become District 9423. He then spoke on the Regionalisation project of Zone 8, covering Australia, New Zealand and Pacific Islands. An email will be sent to all members on where to access further information on this. This is a Pilot Project to be run from 2023 to 2026, subject to a 67% YES vote at every stage from Club up to Region. The pilot project is to determine the way forward, and to trial and tweak the best way to do this. A major consideration for this project is to make Rotary less top heavy and reduce the cost structure. It is imperative that all members read the information on this and participate in the voting at club level on 12 September 2022. Joyce asked Kenn to draw the door prize, which was won by Martin Houchin, Martin had Kenn draw the name for the Joker: Gail McCulloch was the recipient of a bottle of wine, and to a great sigh of relief from the room, did not draw the Joker. The kitty is now over \$1400, and we are down to 8 cards! Nail biting stuff....

Colin entertained us with Happy Dollars, yours truly being the first offender, as I left my name badge at home!

The President's language challenge from last meeting proved to be just that. The question: "What is the Greek word for "Good Morning"?" The answer: Kalimera. 1. REGIONALISATION. All about Rotary CREATING TOMORROW.

Chris W last week gave an overview on the RI Pilot Project of Regionalisation to cover Rotary Districts in Aust, NZ and the Pacific region, known as Zone 8.

He highlighted the critical problems facing our Rotary world today, and the absolute necessity of making better decisions for our future.

Our Zone 8 must approve participation in a 3 year pilot project to develop, test and evaluate anew regional approach to supporting and governing Rotary and Rotaract Clubs. This will commence from July, 2023.

However, this can only proceed IF a 2/3rd majority of Clubs and Districts support the process.

A <u>YES</u> vote will allow this to progress... a <u>NO</u> vote will consign us, as I see it, to struggling for relevance in a changing world.

Club Presidents will vote on behalf of their Club, but it is essential that Clubs get involved in the decision making.

We must cast our Club vote in the week commencing the 22nd of Sept, so if you have any questions, or comments, let Logan, Chris or I know.

- 1. Identify possible participants and provide their contact details to me after you have shared an outline of the program with them and they have shown interest
- 2. Nominate yourself for one or more of the following positions:
 - a. A buddy-mentor for the participants (staying in touch and escorting the ALP Member whilst they establish relationships within the club)
 - b. Program coordinator
 - c. Members willing to meet with the participants and share their business/professional background (easy role, not time consuming)
 - d. Members willing to do some pro bono 'coaching' /'Mentoring' with participants. Can be formal coaching or mentoring e.g., practical business experience advice

PURPOSE

- to provide
 - Coaching & mentoring to those aspiring to future leadership positions.
 - personal development opportunities for aspiring leaders
 - network opportunities for aspiring leaders with other professionals
 - to bring at least two younger members into the RCA, for a period of two years.

DESCRIPTION

The Rotary Club of Attadale (RCA) will offer a two-year Aspiring Leaders Program (ALP) for a second year commencing in October 2022. The ALP offers participants the invaluable professional and personal experience of being a member of highly respected community service organisation and developing leadership skills in the process.

Participants will have access to significant mentoring experiences, one-to-one professional coaching sessions and will gain a range of experiences, including co-leading a community service event. The Club will support each participant to attend and engage with the larger Rotary community.

The first year of the program will focus on the skill development of ALP participants, with them being recipients of pro bono coaching, mentoring, training and development, through club members.

In the second year, to further support participants with enhancing these skills, they will take on a club officer role and develop programs and opportunities within that portfolio area and /or lead, or co-lead, at least one local service activity. This as well as providing support to ALP members in their first year.

Unfortunately, we simply weren't able to get sufficient volunteer facilitators to run the camp in a safe, effective and fun way.


We look forward to running the next RYPEN camp in May 2023.

Terms: This offer is open to clubs which are committed to modernising and improving value to members, and whose members have voted overwhelmingly to take part (75% or more in favour).


Conditions:
