President's report.

On Monday we enjoyed the company of 14 members at our meeting. We were delighted to celebrate the birthdays of Llew Withers and Martin Houchin with a cupcake and song.

After our meal, Martin spoke to us on the Maker's Market parking requirements for Sunday 21st May, we have our regular shifts covered, any other offers would be welcomed. Llew Withers gave us an update on the collection of bottles and cans, and a reminder that anyone requiring the Barcode for having the funds for these credited to Attadale Rotary should reach out to either him or Colin.

Llew also covered the intention to have a hosted night by Peter Kenyon to ascertain the needs and wants of members, potential future projects and how we can align this to community needs and wants. Shelley Konig has either handed out or emailed the invoices for Member dues for 2023/24 year. Please make an effort to have these paid by 31 May, which is the end of our financial year - it makes for a much smoother transition. Shelley also covered some of the projects in the planning stage, such as a movie night and a Comedy evening amongst others. Colin McCulloch also covered the containers for change, and showed how easy it is to have the barcode in your Smartphone Wallet and is more than happy to share the know-how with anyone who would like to do this. Colin's request for members to advise their absence has worked really well, these are set up on a spreadsheet, making tracking absences and future meeting planning so much easier. Colin had the first 10 respondents' names in a hat, and drew a winner for a morning coffee and cake voucher, which was won by Winston Marsh.

Bev advised that a number of members have indicated their preference for the smaller magnetic name badge as opposed to the large white badges. The incoming 2023/2024 Board will hold a combined meeting on Wednesday 14 June, discussion will centre around the budget, amongst other business. Our changeover Dinner is set for 26 June, details and menus to be provided within the next week or so. The tree planting project will be held at Point Walter in June, volunteers will be required. Details to follow. Bev also updated the meeting on the recent Zone meeting held by AG Kenn Williams. Volunteer Expo is being held at Melville Hawaiian Shopping Centre on 16 May from 9.30am to 1.30pm, the 4 local clubs will have a table. A second person was sought to assist Bev - Martin volunteered. Jennifer Jones Initiative is being progressed, we need stories and photos of past activities from the Club. A budget was submitted to the DG on Monday for this project. Regionalisation Pilot Programme will commence in July 2023, the proposal is for groups of 10 to 12 clubs with a common interest to work together. This format runs the risk of excluding smaller clubs, so needs to be considered carefully. The installation of Satellite Clubs is being encouraged, particularly in country areas.

A recommendation was put forward for each of the four clubs in our zone to host a combined club meeting once a quarter. Attadale will be hosting the combined meeting in September for DG Ineke Oliver, Applecross will host a Santa meeting in December, Melville will host a Paul Harris meeting in February and Booragoon will host a meeting in the 4th quarter, date and theme to be advised.

The door prize was drawn and won by Bev, thank you for the bottle of white. Winston drew Gail's name for the Joker, sadly the Joker remained shy this week, so a consolation prize of a bottle of red was accepted. Neil McKay set us all a very challenging Happy Dollars - perhaps it should have been a "Happy Quiz" instead – good fun for something different. Well done, Neil J. Thanks to Rod Rate for the delicious chocolate cake to enjoy with tea and coffee.

Terms: This offer is open to clubs which are committed to modernising and improving value to members, and whose members have voted overwhelmingly to take part (75% or more in favour).

Conditions:

- 1. Participate in the Club Citation program for 22-23, prioritising membership growth and club modernisation.
- 2. Participation in a Communities of Practice club development program and other training and development programs related to the project.
- 3. The club will, within 3 months of commencing the project:
 - a. update data on District website for all members to enable the club to monitor improvements in age, gender balance and other key metrics
 - b. update all club online presences to reflect a modern club profile.
- 4. The club will maintain one or more contemporary social media platforms.
- 5. The club will take action to reduce the cost of Rotary to members.
- 6. The club will take positive steps to making the club more relevant in their community
 - a. by identifying local community issues and targeting programs to these

The measurable outcomes

- 1. Significant increase in membership
- 2. Significant reduction in average age
- 3. Significant improvement in demographic balance
