2023 Report on Rotary Club of Attadale Dinner Meeting, Monday, 4 September



to welcome Guest Speaker Hewber and support team of Joe Hewber and Tom Murrell to the meeting, along with Yvonne Rate.

President Bev was delighted

Adam Hewber was born with a rare neurological condition called hereditary spastic paraplegia, which impacts his brain and muscle communication, particularly in his legs. He shared with us some of the difficulties encountered as a child, particularly learning to ride a bicycle and a horse, with some amusing anecdotes. Α result of the difficulties encountered, led him to become a young person with great self-reliance and self-determination, thus increasing his self-worth and personal safety. Despite being told he could not attend mainstream schooling for a variety of reasons, his parents' determination ensured that this was exactly what occurred. A family relocation to the country shortly after commencing school gave Adam a wonderful opportunity to explore his rural location, with greater freedom and fewer restrictions. After a medical event in year 11, Adam left school and learnt skills such as driving a forklift and a car, and sales training in agricultural supplies and hardware, working in the family business. The family subsequently relocated to Perth and Adam struggled to find work, with a lack of empathy, suggestions of inexperience and references to his being a potential insurance risk, just some of the reasons for knock-backs.

This resulted in Adam enrolling in a Fine Arts Diploma at Perth TAFE followed by a achieving a Batchelor of General Arts from Murdoch University. Adam explained that Australia has a vast untapped human resource which is currently wasted. Encouraging people with restrictions to participate and utilise their unique skills and talents has the potential to enrich our society and reduce the cost to tax-payers.

In 2020 a suggestion was put to Adam to start a disability database and after a lot of research and hard work, in 2021 Ability Heroes was registered, also receiving DGR status. This is a project by the community for the community; for people with disabilities, seniors and anyone living with restrictions. The initial website contained the database to assist people with restrictions find accessible locations and plan outings with dignity and respect. At a later stage, a Services sector was added to the website, giving visitors to the site access to over 2000 organisations, providing over 3000 services. Industry and community leaders helped by providing advice and over 30,000 community hours with no funding. Discussions are currently underway to have the information on this database made available on Google Maps.

Adam left us with the following message: promote access, inclusion, and acceptance for all. Ability Heroes welcomes you to join as individuals or as a group - membership is free! For further information or to see how you are able to assist, visit https://abilityheroes.org.au/

Kerry Parsons provided an inspiring update on the recent graduation of students in their programme in the Philippines, with many of these having passed in their respective fields "Cum Laude". Kerry is to be commended on his continued work and dedication to improve the life of these young people.

Selwyn Castles provided an overview of the recent visit to FoodBank by several of the Attadale Rotary members, citing the vast amount of food that is handled, meals that are prepared and delivered to a variety of schools in WA, providing what is in some instances, the only meals that are available to the recipients on a daily basis.

632 individuals rescued!

Destiny Rescue Care Enrolment

Between April and June, our reintegration programs served more than 1,000 survivors throughout five countries, including 90 who joined our programs after rescue. 760 survivors reintegrated and exited our programs during the quarter.

 - in the nick of time. The women, all between 20 and 45 years old, had all been deceived by the same lie: good jobs were waiting for them out of the country. The victims were transported by their traffickers separately to a neighbouring country's airport to avoid detection and travel fees. When our agents discovered the plot, we acted quickly alongside police to rescue the women before they could be trafficked out of Nepal.

The primary trafficker, a woman cloaked behind fake IDs, escaped for the time being, but her accomplices were identified.

If reports from other survivors are any indication, these women would have faced up to 20-hour days of hard, unpaid manual labour and sexual abuse. Read more about how traffickers deceive their Nepali victims HERE

This quarter, our team in the Dominican Republic helped law enforcement close 20 cases which rescued 21 children.

21 children (ages 7 to 16) were rescued from sexual exploitation in the Dominican Republic.

CONANI (Dominican child welfare services) social workers manage the next steps for survivors after rescue, which can include reunification with family or placement in a residential home.
