President's report.

With many of our members either away or unable to attend, 12 of us met for an informative evening joined by our guest speakers: Bruce and Georgi Ivers. After a few technical challenges were overcome, with me having to manage the computer as well as run the meeting, and a few laughs as I explained that I was jack of all trades for the evening, but certainly not master of any, we proceeded with the meeting. Needless to say, our computer experts were missed!! Abby Parsons kindly took over the photographer's role for the evening, thank you Abby!

Bruce and Georgi gave us an enlightening overview of the land degradation of our rural areas, particularly the massive increase in salinity affected areas over the past 50 to 60 years. The ramifications are multitudinous: Australia has the highest loss of mammal species due to extinction than any other continent, the negative impact on farming, the disenchantment of young rural people being affected mentally with eco-anxiety, due to their perceived lack of interest by older generations of the global ecological situation, to name but a few. As one of the solutions to this problem, Bruce and Georgi offer a programme called Trees Australia, the largest school-based planting program in Australia. This offers high quality hand-planting of trees at scale whilst simultaneously educating young minds about the problems and possible solutions. This is done in conjunction with local communities affected by the land degradation, and school children doing activities that fit in with their school curriculum. An example of this is a classroom of children travelling from Perth to Myalup Beach and spending the day learning about what and why they are there planting trees. The average cost to run this as a day outing for a classroom of Perth based children is around \$14,000.00, which includes the costs of transport, seedlings, etc. Funding is partially met, but assistance is required to grow the funds available as well as the program. Plantings are monitored across several time frames and reports are provided back to the schools involved to evaluate the outcomes. Research is also conducted on such things as tree guards, site preparation, pot size and plant species in various environments. Attadale Rotary will be aiding in this programme in June this year, with a financial contribution from the club of \$2000.00 towards the purchase of seedlings. These are to be planted in June on the southwestern side of the Point Walter sand spit. Volunteers will be required to assist with the planting, and later in the year to help with watering the seedlings over summer. Terms: This offer is open to clubs which are committed to modernising and improving value to members, and whose members have voted overwhelmingly to take part (75% or more in favour).


Conditions:

- 5. The club will take action to reduce the cost of Rotary to members.
- 6. The club will take positive steps to making the club more relevant in their community
 - a. by identifying local community issues and targeting programs to these

The measurable outcomes

- 1. Significant increase in membership
- 2. Significant reduction in average age
- 3. Significant improvement in demographic balance
