


NEXT MONDAY November 27

Meeting November 20

President Colin welcomed guest speakers Thomas Stewart, Michelle Sexton and John Chew. He was pleased to welcome back Jim Calcei.

Announcements

Colin announced that this is going to be our busiest week.

On **Friday 24th** we are all invited to a **Sundowner at Calceis** starting at 6.00pm. Please bring a plate of nibbles to share and your own drinks. Come and enjoy great fellowship and wonderful views of the river.

On **Saturday 25th** we have our **Sausage Sizzle and Cake Stall at Bunnings**.

We have a problem with the buns.

Unfortunately, Mias Bakery have been taken over by Bovells and at this stage: -

- they no longer work on weekends
- no longer do deliveries
- no longer cut the buns
- and the price of the buns has gone up

Colin and **Gail** visited Coles Melville and they have agreed to supply us with 900 buns at a better price but:

- they do not deliver
- they do not cut the buns

We have arranged to pick up 300 buns on Friday and in **true Rotary spirit**, **Bob, Jim, Mal** and **Rod** have offered to come to the McCulloch home and cut buns and sausages.

The remaining 600 buns will be cut at Bunnings on Saturday once we collect them from Coles.

Trish Sharp and **Gail** will run the cake stall. If you can provide cakes, biscuits or slices they would be really appreciated. They can be brought to the cake stall, brought to the McCulloch home on Friday or given to the McCulloch's at the Sundowner.

Bunnings have come up with more requirements. One of which is that the money must be counted on the premises at the end of the sausage sizzle. Previously it is a job Colin has done after we get everything home, clean everything, including ourselves, and relax.

On **Saturday 26th** we have our movie fundraiser at the Cygnet.

Board Report

Colin gave a summary of the last Board meeting with some of the main points being:

- Carole has been granted six months leave of absence to look after David.
- Max Anderson has been made an Honorary Member, with a special presentation to be made at the Christmas Dinner Meeting
- The summer calendar was finalized with attendances on January 29 to be checked.
- Five percent of future fund-raising profits will be directed to a Club account for the administration, advancement and promotion of our Club and Rotary.
- The Christmas Dinner Meeting was organized and will be subsidized to keep the cost to all guests at \$40, the same as last year.
- The Board also discussed the proposed Dog Show, making better use of our wonderful, new website (particularly to recognize our sponsors and promote our big events), succession planning and lessons learned from Kalamunda's "Opera at Twilight".

Guest Speakers

Colin introduced **Michelle** and **John** saying they are a cut above the average student because they have been selected into the Murdoch Student Emerging Leaders programme.

Michelle and John explained how they and two other students implemented the RCA programme to improve the employability of our youth as they lack suitable skills.

The MSEL team worked with Year Ten students and staff from Melville Senior High School, Rotarians from RCA and Career Advisors from Murdoch.

They ran three workshops and had questionnaires and surveys to successfully improve the employability of the participating students.

Thomas Stewart, the MSEL Programme Coordinator, congratulated the team on doing so well on a challenging topic.

He thanked RCA for providing a real and meaningful project and hoped that we would participate again next year.

Challenges

Colin said he had been President for twenty meetings and thought it was a good time to look back at the challenges facing the Club that he outlined at his first meeting.

John has kept in close touch with Jessica Beultmann at Foundation headquarters getting all aspects of the grant vetted and compliant. Jessica encouraged us to lodge the application so we feel mildly optimistic.</p>

Global Grant

John explained that if we can get the Global Grant it will be of great benefit to the School of St Yared. Rotary International are impressed with the project and have been in close contact with John as he works through all of the issues. One of those being, making sure it is a Rotary, Not a Hope for Children project. John explained that the school shifting to the new location cannot happen without Rotary's involvement. John is feeling more confident and is awaiting a response from RI before re-submitting the application.

He did remember his family had a live-in maid.

His home was near the biggest football ground in the British Isles and he remembers being able to hear the noise of the crowd two miles away.

His father was a sheep farmer and Selwyn was pleased to say he only had good looking sheep!!!!


He lived in a hydro village where there was great fishing in the river so he fished every day on the way to and from school.

If members are unable to undertake their allocated duty on any date, please arrange a swap.

The **set up and pack up** Rotarians shall:

- Arrive at least 30 mins before the meeting starting time
- Retrieve the Australian flag(s), the Sergeant's gavel and gong, collection box, international pig, President's dais with Chain of Office, two bottles of wine and a gift coaster for the Guest Speaker
- The small flags shall be spread around the tables and the large flag shall be appropriately displayed
- The Sergeant's and President's items are to be placed on the President's table
- The microphone provided by Tompkins on Swan shall be turned on and tested
- At the completion of the meeting, all items shall be returned to the storeroom cupboard

The **hosts** shall:

- Arrive at least 30 minutes before meeting starting time
- Retrieve the wooden badge holder cabinet from the storeroom and place it within greeting area
- Greet all Rotarians with a handshake and give them their badge.
- Greet guests and welcome them and introduce them to at least two Rotarians
- Greet the guest speaker if the Chairperson is unavailable
- After the meeting, retrieve all name badges, place them in the wooden cabinet and return to storeroom

The **chairperson** shall:

- Read the Bulletin in advance and then contact Program Director for CV of speaker
- Arrive at Dinner Meeting venue at least 35 mins before starting time
- Greet and welcome the GS at the entrance and introduce them to the President and at least four Rotarians
- Assist the GS to setup his/her audio/visual and any other aids
- Show GS where to sit down for dinner on President's table and where to speak
- Advise GS to speak for 20-30 minutes (or as agreed with Program Director) including questions
- Introduce the GS by name and topic when requested by the Sergeant or President
- Formally introduce the GS by written CV addressing name, vocation, qualifications, family (if appropriate), interests and lastly topic
- Chair the speaker session allowing one question per Rotarian or Guest
- Terminate the session with the presentation of the gift coaster (from Secretary)
- Escort the GS to the door after the meeting (and to their vehicle if appropriate)
