How Care Cure Support began and what it does.

In September 2001, **Ann Whiteman** – successful Western Australian businesswoman, wife of **Ross Whiteman** and mother to **David and Mark** – began her battle with MND.

After nine months, Ann lost her battle and sadly passed away.

Until Ann's diagnosis, MND was completely unknown to the Whiteman family; however, before her passing, Ann made it clear that she wanted the family to do something about MND, and to support people living with the disease, and their families.

Ann's wishes drove the Whiteman family to get behind various MND fundraising efforts and in particular, the MNDAWA.

Ross and David served as President and Vice President respectively for some 14 years, whilst Mark became a key financial supporter through the business affiliations.

Care Cure Support is a health promotion organisation and charity that raises funds to provide support for people living with Motor Neurone Disease (MND) and their families.

Their long-term aim is to contribute to a world where MND is no longer 100% terminal, by helping to uncover what causes MND and eventually finding a cure.

All administration expenses and administration staff are underwritten by the Whiteman Family, ensuring 100% of all money raised goes directly to the fund.

Marianne Dravnieks and Karen Lamont ~ 'Orange Sky'

Marianne Dravnieks and **Karen Lamont** are volunteers for Orange Sky here in Perth and between them they shared the story of how it all began.

in 2014 best mates Nic Marchesi and Lucas Patchett built the first mobile Orange Sky Laundry to help the homeless. They believed everyone had the right to the dignity hygiene affords.

Their aim was to restore respect and raise health standards.

In 2016, both aged 21, were recognised as Young Australians of the Year for their world first mobile Orange Sky Laundry and shower service run by volunteers.

Their idea has rapidly expanded to other states in Australia and recently New Zealand

The custom fitted vans each have two commercial washing machines, two dryers and some also have showers.



The vans are able to be plugged into power and water at a lot of their locations, but if this is not an option, all the vans have water tanks and generators on board, which means they are able to operate anywhere in Australia without needing access to power or water.

Before every shift, they fill up the clean water tanks, and after shift, empty the grey water directly into a sewer point.

Each van has a retractable awning, which helps to protect the volunteers and friends from the weather. They also have sunscreen on board every van.

They believe that the major impact of Orange Sky does not rely on washers spinning, dryers tumbling or the showers, it happens on the six orange chairs, which are pulled out at each shift in every location across Australia.

This is where the volunteers are able to connect through genuine conversation, not counselling or consulting but listening.

Trust takes time and an enormous amount of trust is gained when the homeless hand over their clothes to be washed as sometimes they are the person's only possessions.

The organisation receives income from a number of different sources, including donations from the general public, corporate sponsorships and partnerships, private donors, grants, commercial contracts and merchandise.

They are also lucky enough to have all their washing detergent supplied Australia-wide, by a specialist organisation.

In Brisbane, Orange Sky Laundry has begun employing homeless workers to wash laundry for a hospital. The two co-founders hope to increase those employment opportunities and expand the service overseas.

Each van has set locations and times in which it operates and always partner with local service providers in areas with the highest need, and ensure that they set up at locations where the homeless feel most comfortable.

The song, Orange Sky by Alexi Murdoch, was a huge inspiration for the co-founders, Nic and Lucas, when they first decided to build a mobile laundry van. The entire message of the song is about 'helping out your brothers and sisters', which is an important part of what they do at Orange Sky every day around Australia.


Congratulations to **Bruce** who won the Door Prize and **Neil** who won the Raffle but not the Joker.

Highlights of the Happy Dollars was the wonderful news **Neil** shared, that he was eighteen months free of cancer.



Colin ran a True/False competition that was won by **Keith McNaught**.

If members are unable to undertake their allocated duty on any date, please arrange a swap.

The **set up and pack up** Rotarians shall:

- Arrive at least 30 mins before the meeting starting time
- Retrieve the small Australian flags, the Sergeant's gavel and gong, collection box, international pig, President's dais with Chain of Office, two bottles of wine and a gift coaster for the Guest Speaker
- The small flags shall be spread around the tables.
- The Sergeant's and President's items are to be placed on the President's table
- The microphones provided by Tompkins on Swan shall be turned on and tested
- At the completion of the meeting, all items shall be returned to the storeroom cupboard

The **hosts** shall:

- Arrive at least 30 minutes before meeting starting time
- Retrieve the wooden badge holder cabinet from the storeroom and place it within greeting area
- Greet all Rotarians with a handshake and give them their badge.
- Greet guests and welcome them and introduce them to at least two Rotarians
- Greet the guest speaker if the Chairperson is unavailable
- After the meeting, retrieve all name badges, place them in the wooden cabinet and return to storeroom

The **chairperson** shall:

- Read the Bulletin in advance and then contact Program Director for CV of speaker
 - Arrive at Dinner Meeting venue at least 35 mins before starting time
 - Greet and welcome the GS at the entrance and introduce them to the President and at least four Rotarians
 - Assist the GS to setup his/her audio/visual and any other aids
 - Show GS where to sit down for dinner on President's table and where to speak
 - Invite the GS to stay for tea or coffee afterwards and ask them if they are happy to answer questions then
 - Advise GS to speak for 20-30 minutes (or as agreed with Programme Director) including questions
 - Introduce the GS by name and topic when requested by the Sergeant or President
 - Formally introduce the GS by written CV addressing name, vocation, qualifications, family (if appropriate), interests and lastly topic. This should take from one to two minutes only.
 - Chair the speaker session allowing one question per Rotarian or Guest
 - Terminate the session with the presentation of the gift coaster (from Secretary)
 - Escort the GS to the door after the meeting (and to their vehicle if appropriate)
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
